

Grave markers are key sources of historical information for families. researchers, and genealogists. The Library of Virginia previously preserved twelve volumes of order books from the J. Henry Brown Monuments Company in Richmond dating from 1899 through 1920. Recently, fourteen additional volumes were uncovered. Spanning from 1928 to 1958. these newer volumes are now part of the Library of Virginia's collection. Together, they offer an unparalleled view of grave markers across the region. The order books contain thousands. of detailed entries spanning six decades, documenting markers erected in almost every cemetery in central Virginia. These volumes cross racial, religious, and economic boundaries and are the only surviving records for many markers that no longer exist.
